- Every single county in the U.S. experiences food insecurity
- 86% of the hardest-hit counties are rural often with the fewest resources
- Child food insecurity reaches nearly 50% in some areas meaning 1 in 2 children may not know where their next meal is coming from
- Throughout the 22 counties we serve, food insecurity has increased by 5.64%
- 234,610 people in eastern Michigan now struggling to access enough food

The Impact of Federal Funding on the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan



Federal funding plays a critical role in the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan's ability to serve communities across our 22-county region. These resources ensure that thousands of our neighbors, especially the most vulnerable, receive consistent access to nutritious food.

In the first half of 2025, the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan assisted 217 individuals in applying for SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits. This initiative is part of the Food Bank's commitment to combat food insecurity by ensuring that eligible residents can access essential food resources, reinforcing its mission to provide nourishment and hope to those in need. Unfortunately, the Food Bank

also experienced a 15% decrease in food supplies from The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) compared to the same period last year. This decline includes the abrupt cancellation of 21 semi-loads of food, valued at an estimated \$650,000. These reductions are part of broader nationwide cuts to TEFAP funding, which have impacted food banks across Michigan and the United States.

A vital program for seniors supported by federal dollars is the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), which provides monthly food boxes to low-income elders. Thanks to this funding, the Food Bank is able to deliver nutritious, shelfstable food to **4,078 seniors** every month. For many, this is a lifeline that helps them stay healthy and independent.

In the summer months, when school meals are unavailable, the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) becomes vital. With the help of federal support, we are able to provide approximately **80,000 meals to children during the summer** ensuring they have the nourishment they need to learn, grow, and thrive, even when school is out.

Behind every meal distributed is a complex network of logistics, partnerships, and dedicated staff and volunteers. Federal funding helps power the infrastructure—from refrigerated trucks and warehouse operations to food safety compliance and outreach coordination—that keeps this system running. These moving parts may not always be visible, but they are essential in our mission to feed our neighbors in need.

Simply put, federal funding doesn't just provide food—it fuels the entire operation that makes hunger relief possible in eastern Michigan.

Rapid Relief in Northern Michigan: A Testament to Teamwork and Community Strength

In the wake of the recent severe weather that swept through northern Michigan, more than **30,000 residents** were left without power—many facing extended periods without access to food, clean water, and other critical resources. Immediate action was essential.

Thanks to the extraordinary collaboration between the Michigan National Guard, local law enforcement, fire departments, the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, and our incredible response team, we were able to mobilize emergency relief swiftly and effectively.

Emergency water distribution efforts were led by the Onaway and Rogers City Fire Departments, the National Guard, and our team at the Food Bank.

Meijer generously stepped up with a donation of 10,080 bottles of water and sandwich supplies to create 1,600 meals. From our own warehouse, we also deployed 100 pallets—76,800 bottles—of Zen Water to help meet urgent needs across affected communities.

This effort was a powerful reminder of what's possible when communities unite in times of crisis. Thank you to every individual and partner who played a role in delivering hope and aid to our neighbors in need.







Celebrating Retail Partnerships **That Fight Hunger**

We're proud to partner with 186 retail stores across our service areaincluding Walmart, Target, Kroger, Meijer, Sam's Club, Costco, ALDI, Dollar General, Family Fare, Save-A-Lot, and Gordon Food Service. These partnerships are essential in our mission to fight hunger and provide nutritious food to our neighbors in need.



Recently, our team had the honor of attending the grand opening of the new ALDI in Davison, located at 7480 E. Court Street. ALDI has been a strong partner in our retail store donation program, and this year alone, ALDI locations in our region have donated 350,000 pounds of food the equivalent of **291,667 meals** for local families.

We also celebrated another exciting milestone: the grand opening of the new Costco in Flint, located at 6200 LaFontaine Way. With two Costco locations now in our service area, their contributions have made a major impact. So far this year, Costco has donated 220,000 pounds of **food,** helping us provide **183,333 meals** to the community.

We're incredibly grateful for the continued generosity of our retail partners. Together, we're making a real difference in the lives of thousands across eastern Michigan.

Advocating for Hunger Relief in Washington, D.C.

These programs are essential in our fight against hunger, and FBEM remains committed to ensuring strong support for the families we serve.
