SCHOOL PANTRY

- Designed to close the weekend meal gap, and allows for teenagers to select their own nutritious food items.
- Pantries have specific hours of operation, and access is only granted to students and their parents.
- Typically stocked with non-perishables as well as fruits and vegetables, snacks, drinks, and toiletries.
- 129,649 pounds served
- **Our school pantries serve kids & their families at 39 sites!**

WEEKEND BACKPACK

- Each weekend, backpacks containing 3 breakfasts, lunches, dinners, and snacks are sent home with elementary school children in need.
- The food is nutritious, kid-friendly, and shelf stable.
- \$150 fills a weekend backpack for the entire year for one child.
- **The Backpack Program helps kids at 139 schools**

SUMMER ENRICHMENT

Many families depend on free school breakfast and lunch during the academic year. To ensure children have access to nutritious meals during the summer months, the Food Bank proudly operates several programs at no cost to families. **The Meet Up and Eat Up** and **Summer on the Run** programs help overcome transportation barriers by delivering meals directly to children at parks, apartment complexes, and churches.

In 2025, our production kitchen prepared and distributed **72,742 meals** across **67 sites**, along with **8,308 nutrition bags** to provide children with healthy food over the weekend. These meals—combined with physical activities and nutrition education—play a vital role in supporting children's well-being until school resumes in the fall.

FEEDING KIDS ALL YEAR LONG

The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan is committed to ending hunger in the 22 counties we serve. The goal of our children's food programs is simple; close the meal gap and allow every child access to nutritious food through innovative program options all year long. In addition, many schools offer grocery items through take home programs.

DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR

Through pre-school and after-school meal programs, the Food Bank provides more than **438,585** meals for children in need. This food provides much needed nutrition during the school year, sometimes serving as the only meal a student receives for the entire day. Without these programs, numerous children throughout eastern Michigan would be forced to endure hunger related hardships that can hinder their development.

NOURISHING DIGNITY FOR SENIORS



The Senior Box Program is available in all **22 counties** of our service area!

DELIVERING FRESH, NUTRITIOUS FOOD TO THOSE IN NEED

Through the hard work of **nearly 700 hunger relief partners**, our network distributed nearly **38 million pounds of food** in 2025. Our neighbors in need were able to take full advantage of the **1,632 mobile pantries** sent out into the community, with half of all food distributed being FRESH! This included **12.7 million pounds of produce**, **2.9 million pounds of dairy**, and **3.2 million pounds of various meats and proteins**.

In our service area, more than **20,000 senior citizens** rely on our programs, through monthly home delivery or pick-up points supported by our agencies. With our monthly senior box program alone, we distributed over **2,276 boxes of food**.

SENIOR BOX PROGRAM

The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, with help from federal funding, assembles a **45-50 pound box of food** to help supplement a senior citizen's groceries every month for one year. Each package contains a variety of foods with important nutrients for older adults. USDA foods align with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans and contain reduced amounts of sodium, saturated fat, and added sugar.

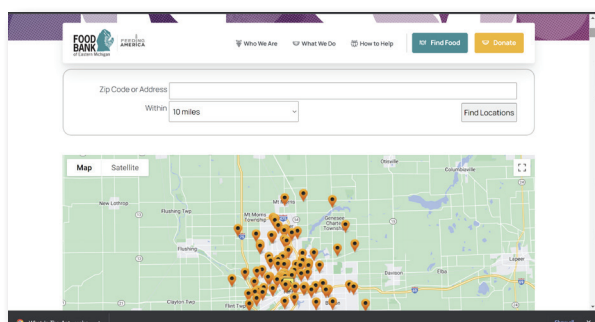
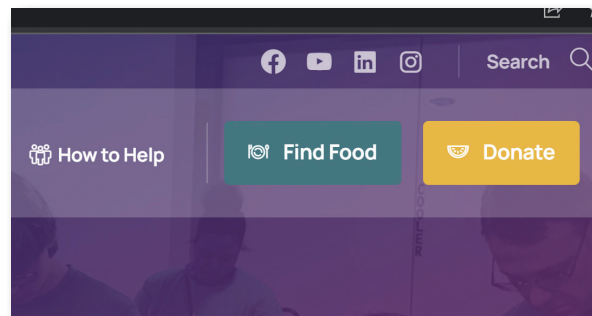

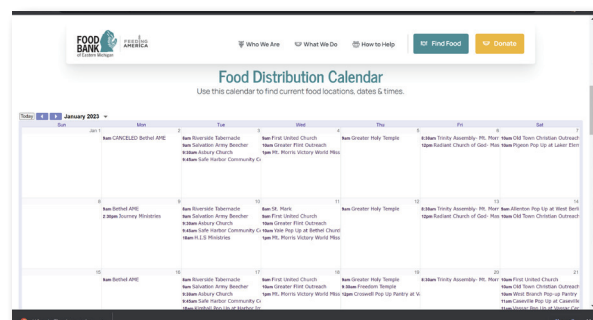
1. On the top left, click **“Find Food.”**

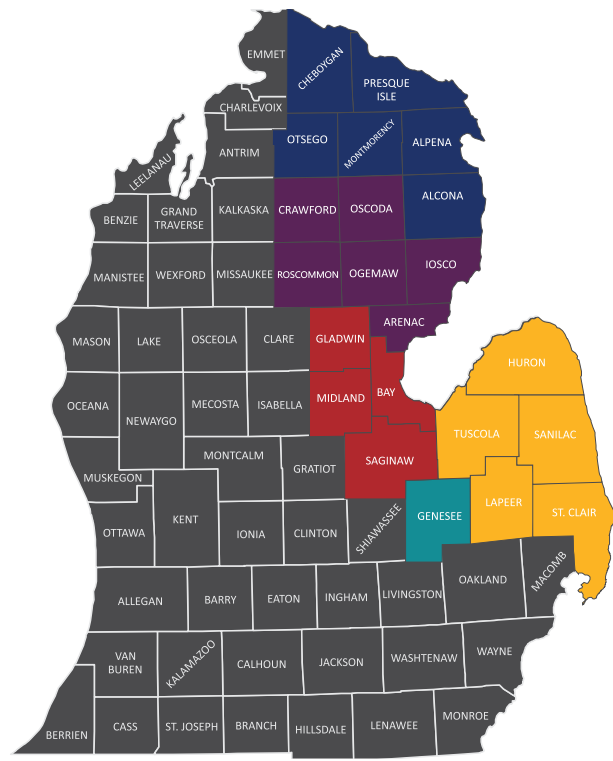
FIGHTING HUNGER TOGETHER



With nearly 700 community partners, the Food Bank serves a hunger relief network that distributed nearly 38 million pounds of food last year. Together, this network works to assist more than 234,610 food insecure people across 22 eastern Michigan counties.

- 325 partner agencies (Food Pantries, Soup Kitchens, Meal Programs, etc.)
- 139 schools offering a backpack program
- 39 food pantries for students at schools and colleges
- 67 sites serving meals to kids throughout the summer

FEEDING HUNGRY NEIGHBORS IN 2025

- In total, the Food Bank distributed nearly 38 million pounds of food, over half of which was **FRESH!**
 - **Produce – 12.7 million pounds**
 - **Dairy – 2.9 million pounds**
 - **Meats/Proteins – 3.2 million pounds**
- 1,632 mobile pantries delivered directly to neighborhoods in need
- 438,585 meals served to children during the school year
- 72,742 meals provided during the summer when school meal programs are not available
- 2,276 senior meal boxes delivered throughout the year to elder citizens in need
- 8,558 holiday meal boxes distributed in November and December to brighten the season
